The leadership in this chorus iprovides such a positive environment that it is easy for us to stay enthusiastic and loyal to this craft.

Spirit's members come from all over the state and many are dual members from both Region 9 and other regions. We even have members from outside the US! We come for the singing and we stay because of the education, the level of excellence, and the performance opportunities and of course, the friendships.

We wanted to share with you some perspectives of this last International competition from some of our members.

- Elaine Corriveau (a dual member with Sound of Sunshine) shared that this was her second time competing at the International level. Her first time was in 2011 in the Harmony Classic. Elaine felt the schedule and the rehearsal space was well planned and organized. She appreciated the generosity and availability of all the coaches who came by to visit at our rehearsals, and she really enjoyed her time in KC!
- Dawn Wilkinson says that the week in Kansas City was a "roller coaster of emotions and feelings- excitement, pride, love, encouragement, competitive spirit, respect, joy, awe, inspiration, passion and trust!" Her first International competition experience was in 2013 when she competed in the Harmony Classic in Hawaii. Dawn joined Spirit in 2023 and is a "seasoned Sweet Adeline with almost 30 years' experience!" Dawn says, "Knowing I had the opportunity to compete on the International stage with the winners from every region already felt different from her previous experience with Harmony Classic..." Dawn says that several factors accounted for this: "Wearing my name badge elicited kind and complementary comments from complete strangers. Our rehearsals were open to anyone and during our rehearsals, many, many people stopped by. I was in awe of the talented people who came in. What I felt during our rehearsals was the true sense of respect, camaraderie and a pure desire to propel the barbershop art form." Dawn says that one of the judges early in the week before competition spoke to her in the elevator asking how she was doing. She conveyed her excitement of this being her first International

competition in the main event and "with a smile, she relayed how she wished she could experience her first time again as it is truly a special memory." This comment led Dawn to make sure she enjoyed EVERY minute and committed the feelings elicited to memory! She felt proud, excited, believing that being among the top ten competitors was a privilege and in her heart she felt the need to honor herself, the audience, and her fellow chorus members, her directors, the arrangers, the coaches, the judges AND Sweet Adelines International by delivering our very entertaining package as a gift from our hearts. We found the convention very well set up at the KC convention center. The staff was well prepared for our visit and there was adequate space for rehearsing and staging (and last-minute impromptu coaching from the pros). The complex was massive with a number of fine hotels in the area. One of our performers had the unique opportunity to share an elevator at the Lowes Hotel with a player from the Kansas City Chiefs! He turned out to be a very charming giant of a man.

There is no shortage of fine dining in KC, if beef is your thing you'll be in heaven. Many singers descended upon Cosentino's Market where all manner of food stuff and an enormous buffet was ready to feed us. We found the servers in the restaurants knew why all these women had descended on their town and they were excited for us! The energy was palpable. What an opportunity to share the hobby we all love. Our chorus was able to put her in contact with the local KC SAI Chorus so she can continue to feel the magic. All of us were blessed by the experience and we gained a sister in song. A good time was had by all and I'm sure we will work hard to be able to experience the joy again!

They should also coach with Regional Faculty when possible. Quartets meeting this criteria will have their quartet registration paid for one year. They are not expected to compete, but are certainly welcome to do so if all members of the quartet agree. The goal is to have up to six quartets form, so that members can benefit from the experience of singing and performing as a quartet as well as receiving coaching. We've already had one full quartet form and have other members that are moving in this direction.

My name is Elaine Haugan and I am the proud director of Platinum Show Chorus in Melbourne, FL. I joined The Song of Atlanta Chorus of Sweet Adelines in 1977, by invite from a client. As a vocal music major in college, I had not yet found an outlet for singing other than the church choir and I was thrilled to be asked! On my first night, a trio of ladies asked if I would like to sing in their quartet, so the following week I auditioned for the chorus as tenor with my new quartet. I remained in Atlanta until 1986, and sang in 3 other quartets in that time period, one of which was Goldrush, (1st place in Region 9 in 1981, the year the region divided into two).

Being from West Palm Beach, I returned there after marrying Jack, 39 years ago and with whom I have 3 grown children (and 4 grands). I joined

the Royal Palm Chorus almost immediately and enjoyed singing with them and That's Class quartet. I later became a founding member of Women of Note. More quartets...including Rhinestones and Rhythm and Fireworks (12th Int'l).

I am a retired Church Preschool Director and Administrator. I've also held all positions in these different choruses, particularly as Choreographer, but decided to join the Director's Certification Program and step it up. When our director retired from Women of Note, I stepped in as Interim Director until we found a full-time replacement. I was asked to step in the position of Director of the Platinum Show Chorus in 2004 for 3 years. I stepped back into Directing PSC in 2020.

Sweet Adelines has been a life-time passion; thankfully, my family has been very supportive. I would advise anyone aspiring to Directing to start the DCP program and work it a little at a time — even if you never direct, the education is well worth it!

PAPER, PATIENCE AND A **DOLLAR NINETY-EIGHT**

When Winnipeg's Show Committee began planning for the Chapter's "P-f-f-ft It's Magic" Show, they wanted quick as a wink costume changes - the right - before - your - eyes - kind that bring gasps of admiration from audiences-and, the costumes had to be cheap. The problem fell into the lap of Staging Chairman, Helen Clarke, and what she did with an old white cotton basic dress, paper serviettes, (that's Canadian for table napkins), and some velcro, should go down in history.

Pictures tell the story better than words, but these can't begin to describe the colour and excitement created by the appearance of the 70member chorus, plus the lights and other stage effects that were used. Unfortunately Winnipeg's magnificent new Centennial Concert Hall does not serve well as a photographic studio, and pictures taken there were not suitable for reproduction. However, the Winnipeggers hope that other chapters may get some helpful ideas from what they have to show.

Bea Fines Winnipeg Chapter

Zip, zip, and here is costume number 2. Margaret with one quick pull, has unfastened her long gown and tossed it aside. (During the performance they went down between the risers which had cardboard backs to conceal the tossed off ma-terial.) She has flipped her lei around to the front, discarded the feathers in her hair and unfolded a paper flower that was fastened to the headband under the feathers. She's now Hawaiian! Colours: bright yellow, green, and white. Songs: "Blue Hawaii" and "Hawaiian Wedding Song."



Off with the lei and the headband, and on with another paper frill. This one was made the same as the first, and attached to the basic white dress with small pieces of velcro. (No, it didn't show during the Hawaiian part.) The boa is also paper, not ostrich plumes. Colours: white and hot pink. Songs: "Charleston" and "Banjo's Back In Town.



Margaret Robinson is modeling the "Broadway" outfit worn for the chorus' first two numbers. That fluffy-looking stuff was made from the serviettes. These were the double kind that were separated into filmy sheets, cut in half, piled eight layers thick and sewed in rows onto nylon net backing. They were then cut to the sew line into tiny strips, and given a good shaking. Result -fur? feathers? Take your pick. The whole thing was then tacked onto a nylon net overdress as was the long gathered skirt bottom, made of ravena lining which looks like satin on stage. The feathers in Margaret's hair were made much the same way as the dress trim, except that they were wired down the middle and fastened to a headband. Colours were deep blue, medium blue, and white. Songs: "Give My Regards to Broadway" and "Cabaret."

Here is Margaret from the back. What a revelation! The nylon net was held in place by small pieces of velcro at the middle back. The lei of paper flowers was attached to her shoulders with more velcro.

For the second half of the show, the chorus appeared in long white formals with a detachable panel showing piano keys, and sang "Sound of Music" "Roses of Picardy" followed, and the roses bloomed with the aid of a swinging side to the panel. In the second picture model Eileen Ibbot is loosening this part of the panel, which was held in place by velcro, and in the third she has flipped it over, fastened it on the other side and presto, an entirely new look! The *rose* panel is royal blue, and the roses are of flourescent material that shines like crazy under blacklight. The roses "died" near the end of the song. You guessed it-the panel was simply switched back. The capacity crowd of about 2200 oohed and aahed over this one.
