

A Cappella Bay Show Chorus Celebrates 75 Years!

On July 25, 2024, A Cappella Bay Show Chorus will celebrate its 75th year!





On July 25, 1949, Sunshine City Chapter formed in St. Petersburg, Florida. It was the first Sweet Adelines chorus chapter in Region 9, the third chorus chartered under Sweet Adelines, and the only chapter east of the Mississippi at that time. The first director was Terry Cavan, and the founder was Nancy Barrett. Sunshine City's first competition was in 1955, and in 1960 the chorus placed first in the Southeast Regional competition in Brimingham Alabama under the direction of Wally West. There were two mother/daughter combinations in the chorus – Wilma Cornell/ Harriet Schwarzmiller and Betty Ridge/Denise Helbig. Harriet is still a member of A Cappella Bay Show chorus and continues to help with costumes!

Skyway Chapter, another chorus, later chartered, then merged with Sunshine City in 1969 to form Sunshine Skyway. Thus Sunshine Skyway was able to keep its original 1949 charter.

Sunshine Skyway and Gulf to Bay merged in 1992 under the original charter. The new name of the chorus was Gulf to Bay.

In 2015 Gulf to Bay Chapter changed its name to A Cappella Bay Show Chorus.

Over the years there have been 16 directors and three mother/daughter teams in the chorus.

A Cappella Bay Show Chorus achieved most-improved chorus five times between 2007-2012, and took first place small chorus in 2019. We, like other choruses, struggled to keep going after the pandemic and lost our director in 2022.

Later that year we were thrilled when Lisa Williams agreed to be our director! We competed for the first time in four years in the 2023 competition and were so thrilled to be back on the risers!



We are celebrating our anniversary with a Gala on October 19, 2024. You are all invited, so mark your calendars and watch for more information on Coastal Harmony's website. We hope to see you there!

Unsung Heroes of Region Nine

The "Dark Side" of competition...

Regional Competition. The culmination of months of work. Choruses and quartets devote countless hours to learning music and choreography. Costumes are coordinated; make up applied. The moment has finally come to step onto the stage, under the lights, and show off all that hard work with all the details, big and little, coming together to create a memorable performance. Meanwhile, there is another ensemble working on a different kind of choreography to be performed in near darkness and "sung" in hushed tones. This is the "dark side" of competition.

For those I haven't had the pleasure of meeting face-to-face yet, my name is Candace Dickens. In my Sweet Adelines life, I sing tenor (sometimes lead) with Sound of Sunshine, Spirit of the Gulf, and in my quartet. I have passed the first level of the Arrangers Certification and have just one module left to complete my Directors Certification. In my "Other Than Adeline" life, I am a Technical Director, Scenic and Lighting Designer, and Scenic Painter in theater. I am an adjunct at Florida State College at Jacksonville and work extensively with the Opera Program at the University of North Florida and the Jacksonville Symphony. I was beyond honored to be asked to be YOUR Competition Coordinator for Region 9, combining my two passions of music and technical theatre. The artistry of music combined with the service of technical theatre fills my heart with joy. The position of Competition Coordinator (CC) is similar to that of a director. In theatrical terms, the CC is a bit of a mix of Stage Manager (SM) and Technical Director (TD).



Stage Managers serve as the bridge between the stage talent and the technical talent. As a Stage Manager I am responsible for the flow of a production, calling cues for lighting, effects, sound, curtain, etc. The timing must be impeccable to create those perfectly timed "moments" on stage. The ability to stay calm and positive no matter what chaos a live production decides to create on any given day is paramount. Next time you see me, ask me about some of the crazy things that have happened backstage! At competition, you'll see me checking in with the wonderful crew on lights, sound, and webcast. I touch base with the amazing volunteers that keep the pattern moving along seamlessly. I pitch in when I can to help our fantastic riser crew. I try to say "please" and "thank you" as often as I can. You'll see me backstage watching for the cue light from the judges that indicates they are ready for the next performers, cheering my sisters on as they take the stage, and dancing along to music that I just can't resist. Occasionally, I even sneak out to the audience and take in a song or two before returning to my appointed rounds. My number one goal as a Stage Manager is to "be the calm." As long as I am calm, everyone else will know all is right with the world. If you EVER see me truly panicked, you'd better be running for the doors!

As Technical Director, I have the task of determining the technical needs of our contest, bidding out the requirements, then coordinating with all the vendors to create a unified production. From what type of lighting fixtures to specific models of microphones; stage size and ramp placement; even down to what type of chairs we want for the webcasters and judges, every detail must be considered and decided upon. I serve as the liaison between the panel chair and the technicians to ensure we are meeting the requirements set forth by SAI and the panel chair. Both roles together allow me to direct the "Dark Side" ensemble to their optimal performance.

It has been such an honor to serve as Competition Coordinator this year! I had a blast, learned so much, and look forward to making each year better than the one before!

Thank you, Region 9, for allowing me to serve you!

Blast from the Past

From the 1971 Autumn Pitch Pipe

What is the Coronet Club? Who belongs? What do they do? How come? If you are a rather "new" Sweet Adeline (or perhaps even a long-time member who has never managed to attend our International Conventions in October) you may well be in the dark about the answers to these questions.

The Coronet Club is an exclusive club all dedicated quartet members might well aspire to join someday, for membership is extended only to our Queens of Harmony. Each of us proudly wears our Crown and Gold Medal. Whether our quartet is disbanded or still organized and active, each is a lady with glorious memories of being a Oueen with many interesting stories to tell about her quartet.

If history is your bag, we could admit that efforts were made earlier to organize the "Champions," who have come to be known officially in Sweet Adelines as Queens of Harmony. However, it was at a reception honoring the newly crowned Sweet and Lows, hostessed by the Cracker Jills in Peoria, Illinois, on October 26, 1958, where to quote a report, "singing, laughing and reminiscing together brought a thrill that is hard to express in mere words ... and, before the spell was broken, we decided to form an organization exclusively for members of Queens of Harmony quartets." Others present on this auspicious occasion were the Quarternotes, three of the Nota-Belles, one Junior Misses and one Johnson Sister.

The group chose Renee Limburg (now Craig) as Temporary Chairman, and then elected her as their first President, with Phyl Odders, Treasurer and Ruth Geils, Secretary. Our purpose in the beginning was to form a closer relationship among the members of our Champion quartets, the International Organization and all Sweet Adelines. In Tucson, Arizona, the following year we chose the Coronet Club as our name and presented the little white capes to the Yankee Misses. We thought this touch of royalty to be a perfect gift to our new Oueens from the Coronet Club. (In later years we tired of seeing our lovely ladies all resembling each other in our capes, which found little use following the "big" night, so we opted for crown cases as the perfect, needed gift for our Queens. This year we are presenting crown cases specially designed and made up to our specifications by Gordon Clausen, Quarternotes Ginny's husband.)

All didn't go smooth and easy for the Coronet Club. After a strong start we had a few years of administrative difficulties. It is rather difficult to have a group that gets together only once a year (different Queens make the Conventions each year, you know) and must do all of its planning via the mails, not to mention that Convention scheduling was getting much tighter and it was almost impossible to find a convenient time for our Queens to meet.

International President, Judy Rowell (Cracker Jill baritone), cured our doldrums in 1965 by appointing Jo Dugger of the International Board as Chairman of a Coronet Club Committee with Queens, Gladys Clark, Renee Craig and Jewel King, as members. Correspondence flew fast and furious and we were activated again as Judy had planned. At the May 1967 International Board Meeting, the Board voted to assign a staff member at International Headquarters to act as Secreatry-Treasurer to the Coronet Club. Norma Prophet has been keeping us on the track ever since and her dedicated efficiency has been most helpful. All of the Queens are most appreciative of her devotion to details, which keeps us functioning as the Coronet Club.

It was the Coronet Club who presented the special Gold Medal to Kaye Poulsen in 1961, following her seven years as a medal-less "substitute" baritone with the Ouarternotes. The Coronet Club's actions are subject to the approval of the International Board. (We are the only Club within the Organization!) During our annual meeting held during Convention week we discussed ways and means of improving programs and how Queens can be of service to the Organization that means so much to us.

1966 at Houston marked the beginning of the Coronet Club Shows. It was called "An Evening with the Champions" and was presented on Wednesday evening at the Rice Hotel. An overflow crowd of enthusiasts appluaded their approval from beginning to end as they heard the Queen's Chorus singing Renne's "Champion Strut" and "Coronet Waltz," which have become

featured songs yearly in the show.

Things were done a little differently in 1967. The Coronet Club Show was moved to a Saturday afternoon following the Membership Luncheon so that Ramapo Valley could present their great "Checkerberry Land" Show on Wednesday evening, but since that time the "Evening with the Champions" has remained on the Convention Schedule as a Wednesday evening event. After all the expenses are paid the proceeds of this show are retained by the Coronet Club. The major portion of the profit is split among the quartets participating (to help defray cost for them to get to the Convention) and the remainder is kept in the Coronet Club treasury for operating expenses. That is why the "Evening with the Champions" ticket is not included in the Convention Registration fee and must be purchased separately at Convention. The hostess chapter helps the Coronet Club in countless ways—setting up for this show, handling the ticket sales and manning the doors, at no profit to themselves, but just to help the Queens along.

It is our hope that you members will find an "Evening with the Champions" one of the highlights of your Convention trip yearly, and that you will continue supporting us by your attendance. Plan your Kansas City Kaper so that you are in the audience at 9 p.m. when the curtain rises on this year's show. The Metropolitans are in charge of planning the "Evening with the Champions" for Kansas City. You'll be hearing the Quarternotes, Gaytones, Note-Cracker Sweets, Hurricane Honeys and our current Queens, the Rarities. Besides their special spots on the show, these voices will join our "individual" Queens and thrill you with their combined Queenly sound. We'll be there looking

across the footlights for YOU in Kansas City!

DEDICATED DIRECTORS

James Kastler, South Florida Jubilee



James started directing the South Florida Jubilee chorus in 1999. At the time, Nancy Bowers was directing both the Plantation Sunshine Chordsmen and South Florida Jubilee but had decided to retire. James had been her assistant director with the Sunshine Chordsmen. He knew some of the members of South Florida Jubilee from the joint shows they had done with them, and he was asked if he'd be interested in auditioning for their open director position. Obviously, he did, and they decided to see where this young director could take them. Now, approximately 25 years later, we are still going strong. We all know that the best way to learn something is to teach it. Starting as a brand-new director and learning what he didn't know was a great way for him to identify his own areas for improvement and then be able to take advantage of the Regional and International education events to fill

the gaps. 
Introducing Our New Regional Marketing Coordinator
