*Predominant chords should be major triads, dominant (barbershop) 7ths and dominant (barbershop) 9ths. Look at more than just which chords have the highest percentage—it's also important that the strong chords are featured in the hook of the song, at phrase endings, held notes, key changes, tags, and other important spots in the song. Predominant vowels are the ones at phrase endings and held notes—*ah* and *oh* ring most readily.
